Re: Let People Vote - Alleged Campaign Finance Violation

Dear Members of the Public Disclosure Commission (the "Commission"):

We represent the Washington Fairness Campaign ("WFC"), a Washington political committee formed in August 2019. Since its formation, WFC has worked to support the approval of Referendum 88. Referendum 88 places the Washington Legislature's recent passage of I-1000, a measure that would allow the state to implement certain affirmative action policies, before Washington voters this November. Approving Referendum 88 would permit I-1000 to go into effect.

This letter constitutes a complaint regarding an alleged violation of Chapter 42.17A by Let People Vote. Let People Vote is a registered political action committee in Washington State that advocates rejecting Referendum 88.

As discussed below, Let People Vote appears to have committed a campaign finance law violation by failing to report certain campaign expenditures in a possible effort to conceal those expenditures from the public. We respectfully request that the Commission investigate and take appropriate action against Let People Vote, including by issuing appropriate sanctions and reminding Let People Vote of its obligations under the law. WFC hopes that the Commission's prompt action will ensure that Let People Vote fully and timely complies with all campaign finance requirements going forward and enables the public to understand how the campaign advocating rejection of Referendum 88 makes expenditures.

A. Background

Let People Vote registered as a political committee opposing I-1000 on May 12, 2019, listing Kan Qui as the committee's Manager and Treasurer. *See* Exhibit 1 (C1 report). For the first few

months of its existence, Let People Vote's activities focused on collecting enough signatures to qualify Referendum 88 to the November ballot. Once Let People Vote had gathered enough signatures, they were required by law to submit those signatures to the Secretary of State of Washington.

In a video posted to YouTube on August 29, 2019, a self-identified member of the hate group the Proud Boys¹ claims that Let People Vote hired the Proud Boys to provide security as Let People Vote transported signatures to the Secretary of State. See Exhibit 2 at 0:13, 0:56 (Proud Boys video, available at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=1YEErW3f14c). The Proud Boys member explains that the group "picked up" the security detail for Let People Vote because other private security companies and the local police either refused or "were going to charge [Let People Vote] thousands of dollars" to provide security. Id. at 1:36. The video shows the Proud Boys member riding in a van full of boxes, then helping to unload those boxes and carry them into the Elections Division of the Office of the Secretary of State building. Id. at 1:08, 2:45. The video also contains footage of a man who appears to be Let People Vote Manager and Treasurer Kan Qui carrying boxes into the Elections Division building. Id. at 3:00. The man then gives an interview with a colleague explaining Let People Vote's security concerns and decision to hire the Proud Boys. Id. at 4:45.

Let People Vote submitted the signatures to the Secretary of State on July 27, 2019. See Exhibit 3. Let People Vote's C4 forms fail to report any expenditures for security during the months of July or August, however, and they also fail to report any in-kind security service contributions. See Exhibits 4 (C4 for July), 5 (C4 for August), and 6 (C3 with in-kind contributions listed first).

B. Violation of Requirement for Reporting Contributions and Expenditures

In a possible effort to conceal their work with the Proud Boys from the public, Let People Vote has not fully complied with Washington's laws on reporting obligations for contributions and expenditures.

Washington law requires political committees to file a report of "all contributions received and expenditures made as a political committee on the next reporting date." RCW 42.17A.235(1)(a). An expenditure includes "a payment, contribution . . . or transfer of anything of value in exchange for goods [or] services." RCW 42.17A.005(20). A contribution can include "anything of value, including personal and professional services for less than full consideration." RCW 17A.005(15)(a)(i). Services furnished at less than their fair market value for the purpose of assisting a political committee "are deemed a contribution . . . [and] must be reported as an in-

kind contribution at its fair market value." RCW 42.17A.005(16).

If the Proud Boys provided security to Let People Vote as the video appears to show them doing, then Let People Vote has violated Washington campaign finance laws by concealing their hiring of the Proud Boys from the public. If Let People Vote paid the Proud Boys for their services, then the payment should have been reported on Let People Vote's C4 for that time period as an expenditure for security. If Let the People Vote did not pay the Proud Boys, then Let People Vote should have reported the Proud Boys' security services as an in-kind contribution at its fair market value. As the Proud Boys member stated in the video, other security service providers either refused to provide security or were going to charge "thousands of dollars," so the fair market value of the Proud Boys' services is likely substantial. Let People Vote was obligated to report their work with the Proud Boys regardless of whether they paid them or not, and they have violated Washington campaign finance laws by failing to do so.

C. Conclusion

We request that the Commission review and take action regarding this violation as expeditiously as possible. Please do not hesitate to contact us if we can provide any further information.



Signatures submitted for Referendum Measure 88 in WA, would force a statewide vote on legislature-approved affirmative action initiative

Proponents of Washington Referendum Measure 88 (R-88) targeting the 2019 ballot reported submitting 215,655 to the Secretary of State on July 27, 2019. To qualify, 129,811 valid signatures are required.

Referendum Measure 88 would require Initiative 1000 (I-1000), which was approved by the legislature on April 28, 2019, to instead be placed on the 2019 ballot in Washington for a statewide vote of the people for their approval or rejection.

Initiative 1000 was designed to allow affirmative action without the use of quotas in the state of Washington. This means that characteristics such as race, sex, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, sexual orientation, disability, or veteran status could be used as *factors* when considering a person for education or employment opportunities. I-1000 would ban *preferential treatment*, meaning those characteristics could not be the *sole* or *deciding factor* when considering a person for education or employment opportunities. Initiative 200 (I-200), approved by voters in 1998, banned discrimination and preferential treatment. I-200 was sponsored by Washington initiative activist Tim Eyman. Eyman has said "Voters have accepted the principle that the government should treat everyone equally, without different rules for different races."

NEWSLETTERS AROUT

I-1000 was sponsored by the One WA Equality Campaign and was supported by Washington Governor BALEOT MEASURES. Jay Inslee (D) and the NAACP. Regarding I-1000, Inslee said, "We know systemic inequities remain that cause communities of color, veterans, people with disabilities and women to face persistent barriers to work and education opportunities. I-1000 is a well-considered approach to updating our state's policies and ensuring diversity, equity and inclusion in government contracts, employment and schools. This policy will help provide the pathways to opportunity that all our communities deserve. It embraces the parts of the 20-year-old I-200 initiative that work well while recognizing what we can do better to address the challenges facing businesses, workers and students today."

As an Initiative to the Legislature—the name of indirect initiatives in Washington—the state legislature could either approve I-1000 or send it to the voters. The state legislature approved I-1000 on April 28, 2019, largely along party lines with all votes in favor coming from Democratic legislators. In the House, one Democrat, Brian Blake of District 19b, joined all House Republicans in voting no. Two Senate Democrats, Mark Mullet of District 5 and Tim Sheldon of District 35, joined the 20 Senate Republicans in voting no. Senator Guy Palumbo (D-1) was excused from voting.

Let People Vote is leading the campaign in support of R-88. Let People Vote argued, "I-1000 can be summed up in one sentence: It would abolish the standard of equality for all, regardless of races, sex, color, age, ethnicity, or national origin, as required by Washington Civil Rights Act, and replace it with a system that uses different rules for people of different races. Initiative 1000 seeks to repeal Washington Civil Rights Act (I-200) and was enacted by the Legislature on the last day of the session in order to deny a public vote on the matter. Voter approved I-200 by more than 58% of votes in 1998. Why shouldn't voters be allowed to decide whether to change it?"

Of the 38 Initiatives to the Legislature (ITLs) that have been certified and presented to the legislature, five were approved by legislators. Referendum efforts were subsequently filed against two of the ITLs and succeeded in overturning them.

Since the first in 1914, Washington voters have decided 37 statewide veto referendum measures at the ballot. The most recent veto referendum was on the ballot in Washington in 2012. In 81% of cases (30 of 37), the veto referendum resulted in the targeted bill being repealed. Conversely, 19% (seven of 37) of veto referendum measures resulted in the targeted law being upheld. In Washington, successful veto referendum petitions suspend the targeted law until the veto referendum is placed on the ballot and voted on in an election.

Nation-wide since the first in 1906, 521 veto referendums appeared on the ballot in 23 states. Voters repealed 340 (65.3 percent) of the targeted laws. Voters upheld 181 (34.7 percent) of the targeted laws. The states with the most veto referendums on the ballot were North Dakota (75), Oregon (68), and California (48). The states that allowed for veto referendums but had the least number of them were Wyoming (1), Nevada (2), and New Mexico (3).
