INTRODUCTION 16 This matter was heard remotely by the Washington State Public Disclosure Commission 17 (PDC, Commission) on July 23, 2020, by audio and online streaming. The hearing was held 18 pursuant to Chapter 34.05 RCW, Chapter 42.17A RCW, and Chapter 390-37 WAC. 19 Commissioners present both telephonically and online were David Ammons, 20 Commission Chair (presiding); Fred Jarrett, Commission Vice-Chair; and Commissioners 21 William Downing, Russell Lehman, and Nancy Isserlis. Also present both telephonically and 22. online were Assistant Attorney General John S. Meader representing the Commission; Assistant 23 Attorney General Chad Standifer representing PDC staff; and Kurt Young, Senior Compliance 24 Officer, for PDC Staff. Respondent Steve Hall and his attorney, Jeffrey Myers, also appeared 25 telephonically and online. The proceeding was open to the public as limited by Governor's

2	The hearing concerned allegations that Steve Hall, former City Manager for the City of		
3	Olympia, violated RCW 42.17A.555 by authorizing the use of City of Olympia facilities, staff,		
4	and \$9,932.82 in public funds to promote opposition to Initiative 976 (I-976) prior to the		
5	November 5, 2019, election.

II. STIPULATION

The parties jointly submitted a signed Stipulation as to Facts, Violations, and Penalty (Stipulation). Mr. Standifer presented the Stipulation, reviewed the aggravating and mitigating factors, summarized the proposed penalties, and asked the Commission to accept the Stipulation. In response to questions from the Commission, Mr. Myers provided argument and Mr. Hall provided testimony that the Respondent had been responsive in addressing the complaint and was now in compliance with all reporting obligations. The Respondent took responsibility and also asked the Commission to accept the Stipulation. The Commission voted 4-1 to accept the Stipulation.

III. FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Steve Hall served as City Manager for the City of Olympia for 16 years and retired from that position on November 7, 2019. The Mayor and City Council hire and supervise the City Manager.
- 2. Initiative 976 was a statewide ballot proposition that qualified for the November 5, 2019, general election ballot. It sought to limit annual license fees to \$30 and reduce the base value for taxation to the Kelley Blue Book value rather than the 85% of the manufacturers' base retail price, as well as limit imposition of motor vehicle excise taxes. The proposal significantly lowered revenue to local jurisdictions.

- 3. On October 8, 2019, the Olympia City Council heard public comment on the Initiative and unanimously adopted a Resolution expressing the Council's opposition to I-976,
- 4. On October 15, 2019, the City of Olympia mailed a publication ("the Olympia Mailer") to registered voters in Olympia. The mailer declared "Vote NO Initiative 976" in a larger font size in the upper left top of the first page of the mailing indicia inside a blue banner, followed by the statement: "Repairing Olympia streets with your \$40 dollar car tab fee." The mailer included a statement "The City of Olympia Council urges a "NO" vote on I-976" at the upper right half of the first page inside of an orange banner. The mailer included the "Vote NO Initiative 976" statement in two other places.
- 5. The Olympia Mailer included a section that stated "Why Vote No?" followed by three bullet points and an additional statement providing factual information about the potential loss of significant funding for street repairs and improvements should I-976 be approved.
- 6. The Olympia Mailer was sent exclusively to households with registered voters. Mr. Hall stated that the registered voter mailing list was the mailing list the City of Olympia typically used to communicate with its citizens.
- 7. While the Olympia Mailer was developed by City staff, Mr. Hall was ultimately responsible for the decision to approve distribution of the mailer. Mr. Hall approved distribution of the Olympia Mailer after consultation with City Attorney Mark Barber and Rich Hoey, the City of Olympia's Public Works Director.
- 8. As City Manager, Mr. Hall was the day-to-day administrator for the City of Olympia. He was ultimately responsible for authorizing and approving all city expenditures of public funds.
- 9. Based on information provided by the City of Olympia, the total cost for the Olympia Mailer was \$9,932.82, which included \$7,183.00 to print and mail the publication. In addition, the city estimated that, based on 66-70 hours of staff time, a total of \$2,749.82 was expended for City of Olympia staff to produce and distribute the mailer.

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Commission accepts the agreed Stipulation of the parties and orders that:

Based upon its Findings of Fact and the stipulated Findings and Conclusions, the

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2	1. Respe	ondent Steve Hall is assessed a total civil penalty of \$10,000.
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4	2. \$5,00	00 of the \$10,000 civil penalty is suspended on the following conditions:
5	a.	Steve Hall is not found to have committed any further violations of
6		Chapter 42.17A RCW or Title 390 WAC within four years of the date of
7		the Final Order in this matter. The suspended penalty shall not be
8		assessed based solely upon any remediable violation, minor violation, or
10		error classified by the Commission as appropriate to address by a
11		technical correction.
12	b.	Steve Hall remains in compliance with all reporting requirements.
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14	c.	The non-suspended portion of the penalty (\$5,000) is paid by Steve Hall
15		within 30 days of the date of the Final Order in this matter. If he fails to
16		comply with any of the conditions of this Order, the suspended portion
17	-	of the penalty shall immediately become due without further action by
18		the Commission.
