Robert Tykulsker reported via the portal (*Wed*, 12 Jan 2022 at 1:37 PM)

Mercer Island School District produced and distributed (via US mail) a flyer that attempts to improperly and illegally influence the upcoming February 8, 2022 "Replacement Levy" election.

Per <u>RCW 28A.320.090</u> -- "nothing contained herein shall be construed to authorize preparation and distribution of information to the general public for the purpose of influencing the outcome of a school district election."

Very clearly, the flyer not only attempts to provide "FACTS", but the facts are slanted to encourage the voters to support the levy replacements. This is the problem!

The district does periodically distribute information that is consistent with RCW 28A.320.090. In fact I received the appropriate "Annual Report" at the same time that I received the "Fact" mailer.

If the election were not coming up, the MISD would **NOT** be distributing these "FACTS" as a **separate** mailer and hence they are attempting to influence the election.

I would not object to an identical "FACTS" mailer issued by a third-party, such as a PTA. However, as I hope I have demonstrated, it is improper and illegal for the MISD to have sent out this mailer.

I would like to amend my complaint to refer to RCW 42.17A.555:

No elective official nor any employee of his or her office nor any person appointed to or employed by any public office or agency may use or authorize the use of any of the facilities of a public office or agency, directly or indirectly, for the purpose of assisting a campaign for election of any person to any office or for the promotion of or opposition to any ballot proposition. Facilities of a public office or agency include, but are not limited to, use of stationery, postage, machines, and equipment, use of employees of the office or agency during working hours, vehicles, office space, publications of the office or agency, and clientele lists of persons served by the office or agency.

The pamphlet that I received and referenced in my original complaint was produced and distributed by the Mercer Island School District (MISD). That is not disputable. While labeled "FACTS", that pamphlet is clearly a typical electioneering campaign piece, typical of the many pieces that we all legitimately receive in our mail boxes every election season. For example, I received a legitimate campaign piece from the group "Committee to Support Mercer Island Public Schools (CMIPS)" just a few days ago. This new piece is is fine -- it was bought and paid for by a private party.

However, the "Facts" pamphlet that I am complaining about is different, because it was produced and distributed by the MISD for the purpose of directly or indirectly assisting in the campaign and for influencing the election makes it improper, illegitimate and illegal per RCW 42.17A.555.

I'm a resident of Mercer Island and an employee of the MISD. I personally support renewing the levies. However, I do not support using MISD resources to try to "buy" this election.




Replacement Educational Programs and Capital Projects Levies

The Sercer Island School Faced unanimously approved eath an Educational Programs and Operations (EP&O) Replacement Levy and a Case Tech Projects Replacement Levy (Proposition 182 respectively) to be put to the voters on the February 8, 2022 special election ballot. These proposition levies replace existing levies that were passed by Mercer Island voters in 2018 and 2016 respectively. These are not new taxes.

Educational Programs & Operations Levy

If approved, the replacement EP&O levy would annually collect up to \$12 million from 2023-2026 for educational programs and services beyond the state's definition of

basic education. It will continue to fund 17 percent of the Mercer Island School District general fund, including 40 percent of special education funds



What does the Capital portion of the levy cover?

- General Replacement Items: Paving, Carpets, Furniture, Generators.
- and Track, Roofing, Boilers.

 Stadium Turf
- Classroom upgrades: Special Education, Radio and Music.
- Facility Improvements: Field Lighting, Tennis Courts (Replacement and Lighting), Mary Wayte Pool, Bus Lot Fuel Tank Replacement, Electric Vehicle Planning Study.

What does the Tech portion of the levy cover?

- Staffing: Technology coaches, Building techs, District IT staff and professional development time.
- Curriculum and Software: Trend of moving towards digital platforms instead of paper textbooks and classroom instructional tools.
- Classroom Projects: Promethean Boards, 1:1 iPads and potential student laptop adoption.
- Infrastructure Improvements: Internet and phone networks, server upgrades, security cameras.

These levies would replace the expiring levies and would continue local levy funding for Mercer Island schools Brough 2026 and 2028, respectively.


Q: Isn't the State supposed to pay for basic education?

A: Yes State provides a funding all ation for Basic Education : However, the Standing to hula doesn't provide sufficient funding to meet our specific needs within our District. We are required to use Basic Education Services funding for basic education first, before using local resources to meet the standard of ed callon that our community desires.

Q: How much can the District collect from the levy? A: District may collect only up to an amount dictated by the State and approved by voters regardless of assessed valuation changes. 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
