Dear Ms. Blacksmith,

On behalf of Mercer Island School District ("District"), I am responding to questions raised by Robert Tykulsker in the complaint that he filed with the Public Disclosure Commission ("PDC")(Complaint No. 102804). The focus of the Complaint is the District's January 7, 2022 publication entitled Replacement Educational Programs and Operations Levy, Replacement Capital Projects Levy Facts ("Facts Mailer"). Mr. Tykulsker makes two allegations:

- 1) While the District can send out an Annual Report, the District cannot use public resources to distribute the Facts Mailer. The claim is that the information contained in the Facts Mailer would unduly influence the upcoming levy election; and
- 2) The District cannot use its resources to encourage citizens to vote.

With respect to both allegations, the District complied with RCW 42.17A.555 and Interpretation 01-03, "Guidelines for School Districts in Election Campaigns Public Disclosure Law Re: Use of Public Facilities in Campaigns," as revised September 28, 2006 ("PDC 01-03"). As outlined below, Mr. Tykulsker's claims are without merit.

#### I. Fair and Objective Presentation of the Facts:

First, we agree that the District can distribute an Annual Report consistent with the provisions governing "District Publications (Regular)" in PDC 01-03. The District decided to distribute one consolidated mailer for all the measures on the ballot. Basic Principle 8, PDC 01-03. The District distributed the Facts Mailer using the same printing and distribution process for the delivery of the District's annual reports, its annual budget hearing announcements, past levy fact sheets, and District News sheets. Accordingly, the District complied with PDC 01-03 when it created and distributed the Facts Mailer.

Next, Mr. Tykulsker alleges that the Facts Mailer "attempts to improperly and illegally influence the upcoming February 8, 2022 'Replacement Levy' election" and "the facts are slanted to encourage the voters to support the levy replacements." As set forth below, the contents of the Facts Mailer comply with the requirements of "District Publications (Specific to Elections)", PDC 01-03, which provides that a "[d]istrict may develop an objective and fair presentation of

the facts regarding district needs and the anticipated impact of a ballot measure and may distribute it in the district's customary manner." School districts are authorized by statute to prepare and distribute information to the general public to explain the instructional program, operation and maintenance of district schools. RCW 28A.320.090. This includes informing the community of a central component to district operations, funding, and of the needs a district and its students have that the community may not realize. Basic Principle 2, PDC 01-03.

The Facts Mailer provides an accurate, <sup>1</sup> high-level overview of the manner in which the District has used the funds generated from the previously approved Educational Programs and Operations and Capital Tech Project levies (funded items delineated by check marks). By including the revenues for each replacement levy, the District shared with the Mercer Island community the cost it would bear if the two levies were renewed. Without the use of sensationalizing or polarizing language, the Facts Mailer identifies some key items paid for by local levy dollars. It does not prey upon the community's emotions. Instead of equating the loss of local levy revenues to the loss of teachers, the Mailer simply highlights that our District has established, and the community has maintained, a lower student to teacher ratio and additional programs than what the state funds.

The Facts Mailer provides fair and objective responses to commonly asked questions about school district levies and recounting of projected level of funding should the replacement levies pass. The Facts Mailer also addresses questions posed by community members such as why the replacement levies are appearing on the ballot and why local levies are sought when the District receives state funding for basic education. The Facts Mailer clearly and accurately states that since these are replacement levies, the current tax rates will remain stable if the levies are approved.

#### II. Voting and Civic Responsibility:

Contrary to the assertion, the District's inclusion of information about how to vote and encouragement to do so is supported by PDC 01-03. "District personnel may encourage staff and members of the public to vote, as long as such encouragement routinely occurs for other elections." Voting Information, PDC 01-03; Reader Boards/Posters, PDC 01-03 ("Information encouraging staff and members of the public to vote, or providing the dates of upcoming elections such as "vote on February \_\_\_\_\_", may be posted,"); see also Superintendent/designees, PDC 01-03. The Facts Mailer does not encourage the recipients to vote one way or another. Instead, the Facts Mailer simply encourages people to vote and informs the community of the election date, how voters new to Washington state might register to vote, when ballots can be expected in the mail, and where the local ballot drop box is located on Mercer Island.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The Complaint does not identify statements believed to be inaccurate. Nonetheless, the District proffers Exhibit A, a table contained in a workbook regularly maintained by finance, which illustrates that the Fact Mailer accurately reflects that Levy Funding supports 40% of Special Education services in our District. See Ex. A, Special Education, Apportionment Table. Another example of the accuracy of the Facts Mailer statements is the District's Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Mercer Island Education Association which shows the accuracy of the statement that local levy revenues are used by the District to fund additional professional development above and beyond that supported by state funding, specifically two full days plus numerous thirteen separate professional learning opportunities. See MISD Certificated CBA at 30, 74-76; see e.g. 2019-21 Biennial Budget Decision Package at 2 (identifying professional learning days to be funded by the state over the next three years); RCW 28A.150.415; Senate Bill 5044.

Consistent with the basic principle that "school districts are charged with education and instilling civic virtue," the District has and continues to utilize various mediums to offer encouragement to participate in elections, including those unrelated to District ballot measures. Basic Principle 3, PDC 01-03. In the words of our Island Park principal, David Hoffman, as an educational institution and District leaders we feel as though we are "steward[s] of the democratic process" and we try to impart the "importance of participating in" our democracy. As an example, attached please find an October 30, 2016 message from the Principal of Island Park Elementary Email Re: November Election. Ex. B at 4-5. This message, which was emailed to families and placed on the school website, was unrelated to a school levy election – the encouragement to vote was for a Presidential Election

In many venues, the District strives to foster participation in our governmental system. Another example is the reader-board messages outside Mercer Island High School that state "Election Day Nov 3" and "Vote." Providing election dates is a normal and regular practice of the District. RCW 42.17A.555(3); WAC 390-05-273. A range of other activities is a part of the District's customary practice of encouraging the community to participate in the civic process. Such activities include reminders about general elections that have been and continue to be incorporated on publicly accessible District calendars. *See* Ex. B at 7-20, Materials Related to Voting. Reminders about elections with message such as "Nov. 5: General Election Day, please remember to vote" have been included in District email sent to families about other District happenings. *See* Ex. B at 02. Posters made by staff and students about "Rock the Vote" and reminders that those students who have turned 18 can register to vote have regularly appeared in our schools. Accordingly, the inclusion of a reminder to vote in the Facts Mailer is consistent with the District's past practices and, more importantly, consistent with one of the core missions of a public school.

#### III. Conclusion:

The District's Facts Mailer is an objective and fair presentation of the facts related to the ballot measures and encourages voter participation consistent with the District's past practices. Accordingly, the PDC should find that the allegations contained in the Complaint are unfounded, that the Facts Mailer complies the requirements of PDC 01-03, and conclude its investigation.

### November Elections

With elections just around the corner, it's time to talk politics. Don't worry, I'm not going to pontificate about the virtues of one political party or another. Nor am I going to proffer or promote reasons to support causes or initiatives; no candidate endorsements either. I simply write as a steward of the democratic ideals and processes that our public schools are entrusted to teach and safeguard.

The importance of participating in the democratic process was instilled in me at a very early age. Every election year, my house was filled with lively political chatter as my parents debated the important issues of the day. They conveyed to their children the serious implications of political action and inaction. They insisted we watch the party conventions and the inherent drama that unfolded every four years. Back then, anything could happen as parties chose their presidential candidates and crafted platforms.



There are dozens of political moments indelibly etched in my childhood memory, but one of the most enduring and endearing is a family event that repeated itself every few years. My father had the responsibility of insuring that voting in our neighborhood polling place was on the up and up. While he never missed a day of work due to illness, on special November days, my dad lawfully played hooky so that he could fulfill his civic duty. He would leave home hours before the polls opened and return the following

dawn ofter wotes and been dated and recrified. Around noon on Election Day, my mother would pack a picnic basket with egg salad sandwiches, fruit salad and a plastic thermos of hot tea. With children in tow, she would drive to the polling site to feed both her husband and the ballot box. My family would picnic in a back room, or outside if weather permitted, and then we would vote.

In an era before mail-in ballots, flimsy fold-up voting carrels, and hanging chads, citizens actually entered a booth replete with curtains and connected levers to cast votes. I would go into the stately stall with my mom and hug her leg while she judiciously studied her ballot. Eventually she would lift me up to see how her political voice would forever be registered. Sometimes she would even give me the chance to flip one of the switches. Before leaving the booth, she would touch the voting board and whisper, "Good Luck." Then she would remind me that when I grew older, I would have the opportunity to exercise my rights and responsibilities as a citizen of this great country.

I still take those rights and responsibilities very seriously, especially as a principal. One of the jobs of educators is to ensure that our students graduate from high school with a deep understanding and respect for our political system – warts and all. The classroom is a training ground where children learn how to participate in the democratic process. Through critical thinking, problem solving, respectful debate, and exposure to diverse opinions, children become informed citizens who learn how to ask pertinent questions, formulate defensible opinions to complex issues, and understand the responsibilities and limitations of power. Opportunities like classroom meetings, extra-curricular clubs and other group interactions teach our students that active participation is the most effective conduit for change.

Our role in school is not to inculcate or indoctrinate. It is simply to develop healthy, curious, wise young adults who can effectively become the guardians of our not perfect, but extremely precious system of government. Thomas Jefferson said it best: education is the foundation of democracy. An election year serves to remind us that we need to work hard to insure that the foundation remains strong and consists of building blocks that support the nurturing of stellar citizens. That's something we can all endorse.


