Enclosed is a copy of the Public Disclosure Commission's Order Imposing Fine that was entered in the above-referenced case.

At the July 28, 2022 Enforcement hearing, the Commission assessed a total civil penalty of \$6,000 of which \$1,000 is suspended in accordance with WAC 390-37-182. The \$5,000 non-suspended penalty is payable within 30 days of the date of this Order, which is **September 12, 2022**.

15 This matter was heard remotely by the Washington State Public Disclosure Commission
16 (Commission) on July 28, 2022, by telephonic and online streaming access. Respondent Joshua
17 M. Quantrell was provided notice on July 14, 2022, of the hearing date. The hearing was held
18 in accordance with Chapters 34.05 and 42.17A RCW, and Chapter 390-37 WAC.

19 Commissioners present both telephonically and online were Fred Jarrett, Commission
20 Chair (presiding); Nancy Isserlis, Commission Vice-Chair; and Commissioners William
21 Downing, Allen Hayward, and Jocelyn Cooney. Also present both telephonically and online
22 were Assistant Attorney General John S. Meader representing the Commission, Assistant
23 Attorney General Chad Standifer representing PDC Staff, and Jordan Campbell, PDC
24 Compliance Coordinator. Notice was provided to the Respondent and he did not appear on his
25 own behalf. The proceeding was open to the public as limited by Governor's Proclamation 20-
26 25 *et seq.* and recorded.

- 5 2. Hearing Notice, mailed and dated July 14, 2022;
- 6 3. Final Order for prior violation, PDC Case 80230, served April 20, 2021;
- 7 4. Initial Order for prior violation, PDC Case 38893, served October 5, 2018.
- 8 5. Final Order for prior violation, PDC Case 102994, served April 13, 2022.

10 **I. FINDINGS OF FACT**

11 The matter involves Respondent Joshua M. Quantrell, an incumbent Parks and

12 Recreation Commissioner for the Klickitat Recreation District. His current term ends in 2025.

13 Respondent is alleged to have violated RCW 42.17A.700 for failure to timely file a Personal

14 Financial Affairs Statement (F-1 Report) with the Public Disclosure Commission no later than

15 April 15, 2022, disclosing financial information for the calendar year 2021. The Respondent has

16 an outstanding penalty balance from three prior violations with the PDC of \$3,250.

17

- 18 1. In March and April of 2022, PDC staff sent email reminders to all elected and
- 19 appointed officials regarding their missing F-1 reports for calendar year 2021.
- 20
- 21 2. On May 11, 2022, PDC staff emailed the Respondent a warning notice regarding
- 22 the missing F-1 report.
- 23
- 24 3. On July 14, 2022, PDC Staff served the Respondent by email and mail with a
- 25 hearing notice for a July 28, 2022, Enforcement Hearing, along with instructions
- 26

1 on how to participate in the hearing remotely, before the full Public Disclosure
2 Commission concerning his failure to file the F-1 report.
3

4 4. As of the date of the hearing the Respondent has not filed the missing F-1 report
5 covering calendar year 2021 that was due no later than April 15, 2022.
6

7 5. The past due F-1 Reports for 2017, 2018, 2019, and 2020, have not been filed as
8 of the date of this hearing.
9

10 6. There are three prior cases for violations of RCW 42.17A.700:
11

- 12 • PDC Case 38893. At a September 24, 2018, Enforcement
13 Hearing, Respondent was found in violation of RCW 42.17A.700
14 for failing to file F-1 reports for calendar year 2017, which was
15 due not later than April 16, 2018. A total civil penalty of \$250 was
16 assessed in accordance with the penalty schedule adopted by the
17 Commission that was in effect at that time. As of July 28, 2022,
18 the Respondent has not filed the required F-1 report or paid the
19 civil penalty and the penalty has been sent for collection.
20

- 21 • PDC Case 80230. At a March 8, 2021, Enforcement Hearing,
22 Respondent was found in violation of RCW 42.17A.700 by failing
23 to file an F-1 report for calendar year 2018 and 2019, that were due
24 no later than April 15, 2019, and April 15, 2020, respectively. A
25 civil penalty of \$500 was assessed in accordance with the penalty
26

1 schedule adopted by the Commission that was in effect at that
2 time. As of July 28, 2022, the Respondent has not filed the
3 required F-1 reports or paid the civil penalties and the penalties
4 have been sent for collection.
5

- 6 • PDC Case 102994. At a March 23, 2022, Brief Adjudicative
7 Proceeding the Respondent was found in violation of RCW
8 42.17A.700 and assessed a \$2,500 penalty for failing to file a F-1
9 report that was due no later than April 15, 2021. As of July 28,
10 2022, Respondent has not paid the outstanding civil penalty nor
11 has he filed the missing F-1 report.
12

13 **II. CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

- 14 1. The Commission has jurisdiction over this proceeding pursuant to Chapter
15 42.17A. RCW, the State campaign finance and disclosure law; Chapter 34.05
16 RCW, the Administrative Procedure Act; and Title 390 WAC.
17
- 18 3. Pursuant to RCW 42.17A.700, an elected or appointed official who held office
19 in 2021 was required to file an F-1 Report, disclosing financial information for
20 calendar year 2021 no later than April 15, 2022.
21

22 **III. ORDER**

23 This Order will be the Final Order. After consideration of the mitigating and
24 aggravating factors, the Findings of Fact, and the Conclusions of Law, the Commission
25
26

1 assesses a civil penalty of \$6,000 for the outstanding F-1 Report for calendar year 2021 with
2 \$1,000 suspended on the following conditions:
3

4 1. a. The \$5,000 non-suspended portion of the civil penalty due for
5 failure to timely file the F-1 report for calendar year 2021 in violation of
6 RCW 42.17A.700 is paid by the Respondent within 30 days of the date
7 of this Final Order.
8

9 b. The past due civil penalties for failure to timely file the F-1
10 reports for calendar years 2017, 2018, 2019, and 2020, in violation of
11 RCW 42.17A.700, totaling \$3,250 plus costs are paid by the Respondent
12 within 30 days of the date of this Final Order.
13

14 c. The missing F-1 reports for calendar years 2017, 2018, 2019,
15 2020, and 2021, are filed within 30 days of the date of this Final Order.
16

17 d. The Respondent remains in full compliance with all PDC
18 reporting requirements and is not found to have committed any further
19 violations of Chapter 42.17A RCW or Title 390 WAC within four years
20 of the date of this Final Order. The suspended penalty shall not be
21 assessed based solely upon any remediable violation, minor violation, or
22 error classified by the Commission as appropriate to address by a
23 technical correction.
24


25 2. If the Respondent fails to meet the conditions in Section III(1) of this order within
26 30 days of the date of this order, the suspended portion of the penalty for calendar

1 year 2021 shall immediately become due and the matter may be sent to collection
2 or brought to Superior Court as allowed by law without further action by the
3 Commission.
