## Political ads sent by text messages must have sponsor ID

Each year, many political campaigns use text messages to reach voters. Those messages must include sponsor identification information -- also known as a "paid for by" statement -- but can do so under the small online ad alternative outlined in <a href="WAC\_390-18-030">WAC\_390-18-030</a>, which allows sponsor ID to be provided using an "automatic display," such as a clickable link, that takes the reader directly to sponsor identification information.

However, some Washington residents still use flip phones, which may not allow them to follow the link provided. The PDC recommends that campaigns therefore include mechanisms that allow the recipients to request sponsor ID information, such as through a reply text.

Sponsor ID on political advertising is a vital part of maintaining transparent elections for all Washingtonians. Make sure all of your communications to voters follow the law.
