This respondent won the Yakima Co 2022 election for county coroner and failed to file the 21-day, 7-day, and post-general C4 reports. See attached.

This respondent also failed to disclose the quantities of purchased items in his 2022 run for elected office. See attached.

Additionally, on this elected official's most recent F1, he failed to disclose a board position he held on the non-profit "Safe Yakima Valley". See attached.

This candidate was also recently featured in the news for using the illegal drugs that he pilfered off of corpses that came into his office. In light of the above, the PDC should investigate this elected official and determine if campaign funds were used appropriately.

## Notice to Respondent

I apologize to you for any inconvenience caused by this complaint. The chance that you will actually be fined for the violations identified above is extremely small because the agency is averse to doing the work necessary to bring cases to hearings. Most likely this case will simply be dismissed by staff with a so-called "warning letter".

This complaint is one of hundreds that I have filed to highlight and ultimately fix the significant shortcomings associated with the agency responsible for administering our state's campaign finance laws.

What are these shortcomings?

Overcomplicated and outdated requirements that are difficult to understand and comply with. Failure to properly educate filers about the tasks they must perform to remain in compliance with applicable requirements and avoid complaints. Failure of the agency to send regular reminders to filers about pending deadlines. A failure to proactively enforce applicable requirements which enables the complaint system to become weaponized. Non-intuitive, nonuser friendly, and buggy reporting software. Failure to meaningfully enforce core requirements. Failure to follow the best operating practices of other neighboring campaign finance agencies. An agency leadership structure that largely disregards stakeholder input and is slow to identify and resolve major agency deficiencies.

I believe that the best way to motivate the agency to address these problems is by filing a large number of complaints so that the agency's problems become impossible to ignore.

# Police: Yakima County Coroner Curtice was using dead people's drugs when he said he was poisoned

Yakima police are accusing Yakima County Coroner Jim Curtice of evidence tampering, making false statements and official misconduct after he falsely maintained for more than two weeks that someone tried to poison him with drugs.

Curtice told Yakima police that an energy drink, his workout energy shake powder and water in an electric tea kettle were spiked with cocaine and fentanyl, and he was taken to the hospital with drugs in his system after sipping a drink.

His claims fell apart after failing a lie detector test, according to a Yakima police report, and he admitted that he had been snorting drugs he obtained from dead bodies in the course of his job for a couple months.

Curtice's claims of being poisoned and their debunking are detailed in reports and a search warrant filed by Yakima police, which were obtained by the Yakima Herald-Republic through a public records request. Information in this story comes from those documents.

The Ellensburg City Attorney's Office is weighing whether to file misdemeanor charges.

Curtice is on leave to address "personal issues," said Yakima County Commissioner LaDon Linde. He does not know what the next step would be should Curtice be charged and convicted.

"If we get to that point, that is a conversation we will have to have with our in-house counsel," Linde said. "I don't want to speculate on that."

At a meeting earlier this week, commissioners put Chief Deputy Coroner Marshall Slight in charge of the office through mid-October.

It is the second time Curtice has had an issue involving substance abuse. In March 2023, an off-duty sheriff's deputy spotted Curtice at a bar in the Gleed area and brought him home, at which point Curtice started fighting. When other deputies arrived, they placed Curtice in handcuffs and were taking him to a patrol vehicle when Curtice did a leg-sweep kick, knocking over one of the deputies, according to reports filed by the Sheriff's Office.

While the sheriff's office recommended charging him with third-degree assault, Yakima County Prosecuting Attorney Joe Brusic declined to file charges, citing Curtice's mental state and intoxication.

Curtis' wife Kristi Foster, who is the president of the Greater Yakima Chamber of Commerce, said at the time Curtice was experiencing post-traumatic stress disorder as a result of a combination of childhood trauma and 30 years he spent as a firefighter and as a paramedic.

She has said on social media PTSD is a factor in the August incident as well. She did not respond to a message left at her office on Wednesday seeking comment. Curtice also has not responded to a message seeking comment.

# Taken to the hospital

According to the police report, Curtice called YPD on Aug. 27 to report that someone put drugs in his drink at work the day before.

Curtice told police that he had taken a sip of one of his energy drinks, which he said tasted "acidic," spat it out and then started feeling ill, the report said. Curtice said he then called his wife, according to the report filed by Lt. Chad Janis.

He initially told police that Foster drove him to the hospital to avoid publicity, but later said he recalled being in an ambulance with paramedics telling him to breathe, the report said.

In his first statement, he said a test the hospital ran found he had cocaine and fentanyl in his system, but subsequently said that the hospital could not test for fentanyl.

After he was released from the hospital, he said he did a drug test that found fentanyl in his urine, and a presumptive drug test on his workout drink powder and water in a tea kettle indicated fentanyl and cocaine were present, the affidavit said. In an interview with police, Foster said when she got to the coroner's office the afternoon of Aug. 26, Curtice was unconscious in his chair, the police report said.

"She described him to be 'out' and 'staring into space.' She stated that Curtice was stiff with blue lips. When she tried to wake him up he would not wake up," the report said. "She then called 911."

Police confirmed an ambulance was dispatched to the coroner's office.

# FBI and drug-sniffing dog

Because Curtice is an elected official, YPD called in the FBI for assistance to determine which agency should lead the investigation, the report said, and the FBI advised conducting a joint investigation in case federal charges were warranted.

FBI and YPD detectives brought a drug-sniffing dog on Aug. 29 to search the coroner's office with Curtice's permission. Curtice said the only drugs that were in the building were a fentanyl pill and residue inside a blender that was used to destroy drugs in the autopsy room.

The drug dog from the Pasco Police Department signaled the presence of drugs in the autopsy room and had a "change in behavior" in Curtice's office that they at first attributed to Curtice's cadaver dog being in the room previously, the report said.

Detectives also found powder on a work desk in the office that was taken into evidence, the report said.

# Theories

Under additional questioning, Curtice said he had two theories as to how he might have been drugged: The one was someone in the "drug world" was mad at him and managed to get into his office, according to the report, which he admitted "does not really make any sense."

The other theory, he said, was someone who had both access to his office and something to gain spiked his energy drink in hopes of getting Curtice in trouble with the police and having it reported in the news media, the report said.

Of the two employees in his office, Curtice said the most likely suspect was Slight, who ran against Curtice for coroner in 2022. Slight, Curtice told detectives, had access to his office, and he accused Slight of tipping off the media that he received treatment at Deer Hollow, a rehabilitation center in Utah in 2023, the affidavit said.

Curtice said he considered firing Slight after he returned from rehab.

Slight said there was an autopsy the morning of Aug. 26, and that he was doing paperwork when Curtice went to the gym on his lunch hour. When Curtice got back, Slight left to pick up a body, the report said, and was told while he was out that Curtice was taken away in an ambulance.

Slight said he tried to call Foster about Curtice's condition but she did not respond, and then called Curtice's pastor who told him that Curtice had a "medical episode," the report said. Slight told the pastor that he thought Curtice was drinking too many energy drinks, was sleeping in his office during the day and making mistakes in his reports.

# Polygraph test

On Sept. 12, YPD detectives arranged for Curtice to take a polygraph test, and the results showed evidence of deception, according to the police report. Polygraph results are inadmissible in court but detectives will use them as an investigative tool in some cases.

After being told he failed the lie detector test, Curtice waived his right to remain silent and have a lawyer present and, after initially trying to convince detectives he didn't use drugs, he admitted to using drugs three times a week for the past several months in his office, the police report said.

When police asked where he obtained the drugs, "he stated he takes the drugs off of deceased bodies in the course of his duties as the Yakima County Coroner," the report said.

He described how he took the drugs from bodies brought to his office and would snort them off his arm at his desk.

"When asked why, Curtice stated he wanted to know how it felt," Janis wrote in his report.

Curtice also admitted to mixing drugs with his workout powder for the test and spiking his tea kettle to bolster his claim of being poisoned, the report said.

He apologized to police for wasting their time, and also apologized for accusing Slight.

YPD referred the case to the Ellensburg prosecutor for a charging decision due to potential conflicts of interest in Yakima. Court records show no charges have been filed as of Wednesday afternoon.

# **Business and Organizational Interests**

# The Law Requires:

F-1 filers must disclose:

- Every public or private office, directorship, and position held as trustee, and
- The name of any corporation, partnership, joint venture, association, union, or other entity in which is held any office, directorship, or any general partnership interest, or an ownership interest of ten percent or more; the name or title of that office, directorship, or partnership; the nature of ownership interest;
- Payments made by the governmental unit in which the filer holds or seeks office to the business entities reported, and the purpose and actual amount of each payment;
- The name of each governmental unit, corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, association, union, or other business or commercial entity from which the entities reported by the filer has received compensation in any form in the amount of \$12,000 or more during the preceding twelve months and the consideration given or performed in exchange for the compensation. "Compensation" does not include payment for water and other utility services at rates approved by the Washington state utilities and transportation commission or the legislative authority of the public entity providing the service. With respect to any bank or commercial lending institution in which is held any office, directorship, partnership interest, or ownership interest, it shall only be necessary to report either the name, address, and occupation of every director and officer of the bank or commercial lending institution and the average monthly balance of each account held during the preceding twelve months by the bank or commercial lending institution from the governmental entity for which the individual is an official or candidate or professional staff member, or all interest paid by a borrower on loans from and all interest paid to a depositor by the bank or commercial lending institution if the interest exceeds \$2,400.; and
- A list, including legal or other sufficient descriptions as prescribed by the commission, of all real property in the state of Washington, the assessed valuation of which exceeds \$24,000, in which a corporation, partnership, firm, enterprise, or other entity had a direct financial interest, in which corporation, partnership, firm, or enterprise a ten percent or greater ownership interest was held

RCW 42.17A.710(1)(d), (g), and (k).

# **Explanation:**

The first step is to write down the names of every trusteeship held and of every corporation, limited liability company, business, partnership, limited partnership, limited liability partnership, club, labor union, association, government body and the like that you or your immediate family members were officers or directors of, general partners in, or had a 10% or more financial interest in, during the reporting period. You will have to complete an entry in the Business Owned or Other Relationships section for each name on your list.

When you're making your list, keep in mind that:

This disclosure requirement applies to both public and private entities, including "for profit" and "not for profit" organizations;

- If you or a family member were an officer, director or trustee of an organization (entity), include it even if you did not have an ownership interest in it (see discussion of "corporate officer" below);
- Membership in an organization does not trigger reporting unless you also held an office or had an ownership interest of 10% or more;
- You will not include on your list an elected public office you held during the reporting period; however, you will
  include an elected office held by your spouse or registered domestic partner (or other immediate family member);
- An elected official's service on a board or commission that is a legal requirement of office need not be separately reported, unless the official received compensation in excess of \$2,400 from that board or commission, in which case the service would be reported on the F-1 under income.

**Corporate Officer:** Some corporations, including banks and other financial institutions, use various titles (particularly vice president) to denote managerial positions. These "titled" managers have no corporate officer status within the organization and do not need to be reported on the F-1.

A filer would only have to report as a corporate officer -- and disclose financial information about the corporation -- if he or she held one of the offices described in the corporation's bylaws. However, if the officer was excluded, by resolution of the board of directors or by the bylaws, from participation in the corporation's major policy making functions and the officer did not actually participate in these functions, then he or she does not have to report the corporation's activity.

Listed below are some of the more common entities for which you'll have to report:

- Sole proprietor business
- Limited liability company
- General partnerships
- Limited partnerships and limited liability partnerships
- Corporations (if corporate officer, on board of directors or 10% or more owner)

List any other government agency which made a payment of \$12,000 or more to the business during the F-1 reporting period, and the purpose of the payment.

# Payments Received From Business Customers (>\$12,000)

Identify all business and government customers that, during the reporting period, paid \$12,000 or more in the aggregate for services or products provided by the entity you're reporting about. Include the names of any government agency (other than the one in which you seek or hold office), corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, association, union or other business if they meet or exceed the \$12,000 reporting threshold and a brief description of the service or product provided. The amount paid is not required to be listed in these sections.

Be sure to report the name and address of each business or government agency for which a service was rendered or to which a product was sold that resulted in a commission of \$12,000 or more in the aggregate to the entity for which you are reporting.

Do not list payments received from individuals acting in a private rather than a business capacity. A doctor, for example, would not disclose the names of individual patients who paid his or her medical corporation \$12,000 or more; nor would this doctor include the names of insurance companies paying on behalf of patients. He or she would, however, report the names of employers that paid fees for employee medical services and the names of hospitals that compensated the medical corporation. Similarly, lawyers, farmers and other business people would not list "individual" customers, but would disclose their business, corporate and government clients.

Do not include gifts or grants of \$12,000 or more the entity may have received from a foundation, business or governmental agency. These charitable contributions do not constitute "compensation" and are not reportable.

# **Alternative Option for Banks and Other Lending Institutions**

If you or a family member had an ownership interest in a bank or lending institution, or you were a director or corporate officer of one (see discussion of corporate officer above), the second paragraph of the statutory excerpt above applies to you.

Essentially, the law says that, for banks and other lending institutions, you don't have to supply a list of all major commercial or governmental customers.

Rather, you can do one of the following:

- Provide the name, address and occupation of each officer or director of the institution as well as the average monthly balance of each account held during the previous year by the government body in which you hold office (whether elected or appointed) or for which you're running; OR
- Provide the total amount of interest paid by each borrower who paid over \$2,900 in interest and the total amount of interest paid to each depositor who received over \$2,900 in interest during the previous year.

# **Washington Real Estate**

If you or an immediate family member owned a 10% or more interest in the entity for which you're reporting and that entity in turn owned Washington real estate assessed at over \$24,000, you need to disclose the property's street address. If there is no street address, show the assessor's parcel number, the abbreviated legal description included on property tax notices, or the complete legal description.

Examples of real estate that a business might own include:

- Rental houses, apartment buildings
- Store buildings, office buildings
- Plant sites, warehouses
- Farmland owned by family corporation
- Property leased to others
- Property on which the entity had an option to purchase
- Mineral rights owned or held by the entity

If you were an officer or director of an entity, but did not own 10% or more of it or its stock, you are not required to list real estate owned by the entity.
